We look forward to Christmas drinks with Ann at 'The Tuft' in December.


Sadly, I have to report the passing of John Payne in May, a member since 2004. We offer our condolences to wife Margaret and family.

## Visit to Highgrove House - 6<sup>th</sup> May 2008

What a perfect day to visit such an exciting venue! At 9.30 a.m. in glorious sunshine and a clear blue sky, 24 of us set off from Amersham, wondering just what Highgrove had in store for us. Unfortunately, because of the high security, two of our party were unable to replace others who were unable to come, they did, however, have an interesting day in Tetbury. At noon we were met by security who checked our passports or

photographic driving licences. We were shown into the Orchard Room situated at the entrance and although being built within the last decade, it blended in perfectly with its surroundings. Here many pieces of His Royal Highness's private art collection adorn the walls. Shortly after this we were introduced to the garden volunteer, Mrs. Matthew, who was to be our very informative guide.



The Estate as a whole had some wonderful surprises, with each 'garden' layout being different from the previous one. One of the most eye-catching features was a yew hedge which had incorporated some amazing topiary - this, incidentally, takes around three months to trim! Near this stands a statue of the Borghese Gladiator, a copy of the one at Houghton Hall, Norfolk. In the wild flower meadow were profusions of camassia which made a majestic show, being much taller than the other wild flowers.

An interesting fact about the Walled Garden is that the planting area is marked out by box hedges in the shape of the crosses of St. George and St. Andrew. The wide range of vegetables is organically grown in keeping with the ethos of Highgrove.

Prince Charles has a super collection of ceramic and earthenware pots from around the world - both large and small, some which contained plants, others were empty but lying in interesting positions. He also made excellent use of many artefacts which he had been given by incorporating them very effectively into a dry-stone wall The National Collection of hostas was wonderful - not a slug or snail bite in sight, apparently Weetabix is used as slug bait; I must give this a try! All the plants looked very healthy, no doubt due to the fact that all the compost is manufactured on the estate from recycled waste products. Lastly, I would mention the chicken house or 'palace' as our guide jokingly said. This is constructed in a cruciform shape with a steel cockerel on its roof. The chickens, too, looked very healthy scratching around in the soil and grassy areas.

After the two hour tour, we were treated to a cup of tea in best floral designed china, and biscuits. There was of course the inevitable shop for souvenirs, preserves, chocolates etc. and a small area selling plants – the temptation to buy was too great for most of us!

On our departure our driver, Keith, decided to take us home the 'pretty way' via Cirencester, Bibury, Burford etc. It was a most interesting drive in the late afternoon sunshine with an intermittent commentary by Keith. So ended this excellent day out, arriving back at 6 pm. Our grateful thanks to Maldwyn for the organisation of this trip.
