A Garden Fete is one of a series of plays about a group of suburbanites written under the heading "Intimate Exchanges". This production made for a funny and enjoyable evening.



Weekend Break in Cardiff 9-11 June 2006




Summer Lunch—23 July 2006

A group stayed at the Royal Goat Hotel in September 2004 in Beddgelert and they have offered us a particularly good concessionary rate of £52-£55-00 per person per night - depending on numbers for DB&B and with No Single Supplement.
