fish was a regular seasonal catch from the River Taf in West Wales where I grew up. This year, for the first time ever, any Sewin and Salmon caught by the local anglers have to be returned to the river. So, my choice was flavoured with a touch of nostalgia.

As the meal drew to a close our chairman, David Powell, rose to speak. He thanked the staff and all who had helped organise the



event, and then introduced Glain Dafydd, the accomplished young harpist who provided our entertainment. Originally from Bangor, Glain's
