## Theatre Evening - Tuesday 24<sup>th</sup> March

The Complete History of Comedy (abridged)

On Tuesday, 24th March, 20 members of the Chiltern District Welsh Society met at the Wycombe Swan for our annual cultural trip to the theatre.



We all met in the bar at 7pm to collect tickets and chat, before taking our seats at 7:30.

This year's event was to see the Reduced Shakespeare Company's latest work, The Complete History of Comedy (abridged).

The Complete Shakespeare Company is not quite as highbrow as our usual shows. Three American comics ran through the history of comedy from cavemen to the present day in a non-stop series of quick change sketches, gags and monologues which succeeded in breaking most taboos and taking as their subjects a mixture of scatological, sexual and xenophobic settings. They were very fair and tried to offend everyone equally, even the Welsh – very funny.



Ralph Broomby was press-ganged onto the stage (not very reluctantly) to take part in an improvised sketch and demonstrate his ability to provide sound effects to the action



provided by the comics.

The show was very fast paced and finished at 9:30. At we made our way out, the cast were at the door to say farewell.

Overall, there were mixed reviews about the entertainment, with most thinking that the show was witty, clever and amusing, whilst others were unmoved.

# Tring Reservoirs Walk, Marsworth: Thursday 18th June 2015

Ladies Day at Ascot, AND Chiltern-Welsh Walkers Day at Tring. What an exciting day!

The weather was kind to everyone- glorious sunshine & a light breeze. All the walkers arrived on time which facilitated a prompt start to the adventure. The English countryside was at its best and showed off the skills of the canal builders of the 1790's. The canal age & associated engineering skills was quite something.



Did you know – "The Grand Union canal is essentially composed of no fewer than 8 separate canals, and was built to link London, Birmingham, Nottingham & Leicester. The most important part of this network of watery highways was the Grand Junction Canal. It was started in 1793 to create a short cut between Brentford – West London to Braunston – Northamptonshire. The Grand Union was the first to be constructed with 14 foot 'wide locks', enabling boats to be side by side in locks." So there, - look you!

Jonathan Pegler had planned our walk to illustrate the picturesque boat houses of the canal dwellers. Towpaths are a wonderful way to explore all kinds of behaviour. We were given an insight into the domestic bliss of many a family – but only if we pressed our noses right up to the windows on the narrow boats!

We did not need to be quite as invasive to espy true nature. Many a greylag goose with young, coots galore - not always in the water, elegant swans and even crested grebes – though no elaborate mating displays, and of course the inevitable Canadian geese and their young.



I think all the walkers took the opportunity to get to know their fellow Society members – so a very sociable occasion. We met many anglers with 'poles,' not fishing rods, - all busy projecting bait into the blue yonder; we never saw a single fish!
